The second meeting of the SF Dept. of Early Childhood Strategic Plan Advisory Committee washeld on November 9<sup>th</sup>, 2021, via Zoom. Jamillah Jordan of the consulting team MIG acted as moderator for the meeting. The following is a summary of the items discussed.

#### I. Welcome and Introduction

Jamillah Jordan welcomed SPAC members and public attendees in the audience. She started with a brief overview of Zoom platform tools for participants to engage. This included an announcement regarding live interpretation from English to Chinese (Mandarin) which was available during the meeting through the Zoom Chinese audio channel. Jamillah proceeded to give an overview of the agenda and meeting participation agreements.

## II. Reflections on SPAC Meeting #1

Jamillah shared key themes and reflections from SPAC #1. Participants shared a sense of responsibility to serve and hear from families and children, centering healing, equity and value as well as being inspired by the moment for change. Included are the key takeaways for each discussion question.

What is most exciting to you about the planning process?

- Positive energy and motivation from this group
- Resources going to the communities most in need
- Equity as a lens and focus of the new department
- Co-creating a new vision, centered on shared values to guide this work
- This has been many years in the making; excitement that it is now happening

What concerns you the most about this process?

- Making sure we include the voices of folks who might be non-English speakers, newcomers, or those not already integrated in programs or the ECE system
- Want to have the right qualitative and quantitative data to make decisions
- No having enough resources to accomplish what we envision
- We need to have authentic transparency and be responsive to the voices involved
- Want clarity on what "kindergarten readiness" looks like and how we will define this

What's your highest priority for this process?

- To help set direction for this work and the department
- Ensure that the strategies and priorities are doable, and have a solid plan of action
- That these strategies can help the parents in the community
- Collaboration to make change and processes that will support children and parents
- Rigor, accountability, and transparency
- Being centered around children, improving the lives of children and their families

What would make you feel like your voice helped determine the direction of the Strategic Plan and the City's investments? What would make you feel authentically heard?

- Honoring, respecting, and valuing all voices included in the process we are all keepers
  of knowledge
- Hoping parent stories and experiences can shape the policy making

- Collaboration is like making soup, everyone puts something in, and in the end the best soup will serve the needs of children and families. I will feel my voice is being heard when the flavor of the finished product is something I can recognize and be proud of.
- Centering the voices of parents, providers, teachers, and department staff who might not have been included in the past.

#### III. Strategic Plan Roadmap

Myrna Ortiz from MIG next shared the Strategic Planning Process Roadmap, including the purpose, approach, and composition of cohorts for the upcoming parent conversations. MIG will facilitate conversations to learn about the personal experiences raising children 0 -7 in San Francisco of parents who have been historically denied equitable access to high-quality early childhood services and support. Conversations will involve 2-3 sessions with four different cohorts:

- Cohort A: Black/African American (in English)
- Cohort B: Asian (in multiple languages)
- Cohort C: Latino/Hispanic and Indigenous Spanish speaking parents, and
- Cohort D: Mixed group of races and ethnicities, with discussions in multiple languages.

## IV. Key Engagement Questions

Jamillah and Carolyn Verheyen from the consulting group MIG facilitated open conversations between SPAC members around three main questions. Below are key takeaways from each question.

- 1. How can we build authentic, non-extractive relationships with parents?
- Fostering culturally appropriate interactions and inclusive language
- Meeting parents through cultural events, parks, libraries, schools, etc.
- Focusing on intentional trust building and power sharing
- Providing participation stipends
- Following up with parents following conversations
- 2. How can we make a measurable change in Kindergarten readiness for young children, particularly for Black, Brown, Indigenous, and Pacific Islander children?
- Addressing inequity in disciplinary actions
- Incorporating social and emotional preparedness, identity development and ethnic studies
- Shifting the focus away from the child in kindergarten readiness and focusing on teacher and school readiness
- Better supporting educators with the resources to teach through an anti-racism lens, providing them with the tools to celebrate diversity
- Holding administration and faculty accountable

- 3. How can we be a catalyst for true system integration?
- Acknowledge existing barriers, power dynamics and lack of resources
- Facilitate spaces where parents can advocate for themselves
- Create accessible language, resources and tools

#### V. Public Comments




#### VI. Next Steps
