I know parking is always a barrier. Giving myself time to get there and then finding time to park, would be a



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barrier. I would be late, and I wouldn't be present for all the very important information that that we discussed at these meetings. So yes, please do allow for a remote meeting, and that's all

5. Agenda items public comment

Erin: I'm with parents for public schools of San Francisco, and I am blind and partially deaf it is a role, a primary part of my role in my work, and my passion in my personal life is to advocate on behalf of people with disabilities. Especially for public education. So, I have trouble. I am not able to make it into the boardroom, transportation, finding the room, finding a seat, knowing where to face all. Every single little detail that people who are able, bodied take advantage of or take for granted is a detail I have to think through in advance and find assistance and navigate all of that before I can even have my voice heard. Even with a graduate degree, a masters. I want to speak up on behalf of parents, parents that can't make it. I would like to be able to do that from the comfort of my home, where I'm relaxed and not stressed, and can speak freely on behalf of people whose voices are not heard at the table. Thank you for listening.

Maria Luz Torre: I'm the organizer of parent voices and we love to see all our commissioners in person, all this stuff in person, and I'm sure you also love seeing us with our kids in person. However. There are a lot of barriers our first 2 speakers mentioned to attending in person and giving public testimony, and I know that it's tough for many of parents of young children to to come to an evening meeting without childcare. We really support continuing, allowing for remote public comment. We believe it is very important. We have shown that during the pandemic. Many of our parents were able to participate in public comment at budget hearings, because they can keep their testimony wherever they are. So please allow for the extension of remote public comment. Thank you very much

Alex Maykowski: Here's Alex Maykowski with San Francisco, early care and education advocacy, coalition. So, I would also like to comment in support of continuing remote public comment. Significant barriers already exist for our community educators, providers, caregivers, and parents to be able to participate and have their voices heard. Maria kind of mentioned this, but they're often unable to attend government meetings because they're working or taking care of children, and I'm sure I'm kind of preaching to the choir here. You all just made the commute. It's not easy. Now imagine doing that with children, even a higher difficulty level, so remote public comment is really the great equalizer. I think the benefits of continuing and keeping remote public comment far, far outweigh any potential negatives. And it's really integral in



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keeping our democracy healthy and we need a way to keep our public officials educated as well as informed of on the thoughts of people they represent. And we're so lucky it's not the olden days in the nineties, or even the early 2000's. We have all this technology. The pandemic has shown us how to use it. Luckily pretty much everybody knows how to use it now. So that's great, too. So, I hope we can keep remote public comment. It's great. It works for a lot of people who otherwise wouldn't have their voices heard. So, thank you very much.

Vanessa Marrero: I'm the Executive Director for Parents of Public Schools of San Francisco. I want to thank you for the work that you're doing especially for early learning. I do want to advocate that we continue to allow for remote access with public comment. One of the key areas that our organization is focused on is to promote the fundamental value of our democracy. And so, while we focus on Tk to twelfth grade, we want to lend a kind hand to our early learning partners. I am a mom of 3. I know full well what it is to be a single mother, and not really be able to go to these types of meetings in person but have a hell of a lot of lived experience to share. And so, I think that our parents can do that in a way. And that way is by using the tools around remote access. Thank you all for again, for what you're doing on behalf of over 36,000 members of parent to public schools. Thanks.

Melissa Stevens: My name is Melissa Stevens. I'm a member of Parent Voices. I'm also wanting to support remote public comment. There's a lot of barriers. One of the barriers is like the bus. It takes about 45 min. I live in North Beach, and with the rain taking the 30 Stockton and taking another bus towards like City Hall and different areas. It's really difficult. Also, like. you know, driving in the rain today. Especially, I have an autistic child, and it's just difficult. And so please, please, please if you can keep remote public comment that would be awesome. I have other friends, too, that would love to be in these meetings. But because of the barriers, you know. they're not able to do that. So yes, please keep remote public comment. Thank you so much.

Sarah Hicks-Kilday: I work with Early Care Educators in San Francisco and really want to advocate for continued open comment. I have been making calls just today, and even with the hard work we're doing. And I'm sure it's going to change. There still is a staffing shortage and very much both administrators and teachers at sites have trouble getting out to important policy decision making bodies such as this. And I think we are doing hard work to get people more informed, not less more participatory, and keeping open comment in meetings such as this is very important.



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April Leung: I am a parent leader with Parent Voices. San Francisco. I have 3 children, and I've been advocating for over 8 years, and although I did enjoy, public comment in person, I feel like the remote public comment is so much easier. Everybody can get a chance to come, because again, like we hear, there's so many barriers, especially with children, I have 3, and they all go to different schools, and they have different pickup time. So, it's very difficult for me to stay the full time, and sometimes I miss out, and not able to have my voice heard, and so, keeping public comment remote, would really give me that accessibility in everybody else who wants to have their voice heard. So please keep that remote public comment. Thanks so much.

Amie Latterman: I'm the Chief Advancement officer at Children's Council of San Francisco. In addition, I'm a resident in San Francisco and mom to 3 kids that I've raised here and I just will echo what everyone has been saying, both for families with young children who are trying to get their voices heard, and who we're making policy for, as well as early educators at Children's council, supports and families that we support. Having access to remote public comment is critical to ensure that their voices continue to be heard by our policy makers here in San Francisco. Thank you.
